2010 Summer Internship Program in Washington, DC

Description:

APAICS is a non-partisan, non-profit, educational organization whose mission is to promote the participation of Asian American and Pacific Islanders in the political process. Through the internship program, APAICS hopes to encourage the political and civic involvement of young people, to foster their interest in political and public policy-related careers, and to develop their leadership skills.

Eligibility:

- Interest in the political process, public policy issues and Asian American and Pacific Islander community affairs.
- Evidence of leadership abilities and excellent oral and written communication skills.
- Current enrollment in an accredited undergraduate educational institution. (Recent graduates – within 90 days prior to June 8, 2010 - are also welcome to apply.)
- U.S. citizenship or legal permanent residency by June 8, 2010.
- 18-years old by June 8, 2010.

Please submit the following:

- An official copy of your most current transcript. (Please have the transcript mailed directly to APAICS at the address below.)
- A cover letter addressing why you should be selected for the APAICS Internship Program, how you selected your internship placement preference, and how participating in this particular program will further your personal goals.
- A resume listing your education, work experience, extracurricular activities, community involvement and honors/awards you have received.
- A writing sample consisting of three (3) essays addressing the following questions. Do not exceed a total of three (3) typewritten pages (using Arial, 12-point font) for all three essays. The answers to the questions do not have to be equal lengths, so if you choose, you may use more space for one question, than the others.
 1. How did you become interested in politics, and what have you done to further that interest?
 2. What publicly elected official would you consider to be a role model, and why?
 3. How do you see yourself participating in politics in the future?
- Two separate letters of recommendation (from persons not related to you) who can evaluate your potential as an APAICS intern (e.g., from an employer, community leader and/or campus organization sponsor or professor). We may want to contact your reference to obtain additional information relevant to the internship program. Please use the recommendation letter request form located in this packet.

Award:

Interns attending continental U.S. schools will receive a stipend. Interns attending Hawaii schools, or who live in Hawaii or any of our Pacific Islands, will also receive a stipend and a small amount to help cover additional transportation costs.
